LETTER FROM MR WILSON

Welcome to the latest edition of Newsflash.

With the GCSE exams almost upon us, there is, inevitably, a huge focus on Year 11 at the moment; their first examination is only a few weeks away and, in June, they will leave us and move on to college or training. Preparation for GCSEs, however, is a marathon and not a sprint and any success they achieve will be based on five year's hard work and not simply the revision and preparation they do over the next few weeks. Too often, students in Years 7, 8 and 9 think that their GCSE exams are so far away that hard work and commitment now have little bearing on attainment and achievement in two, three or four years' time. Nothing could be further from the truth and the skills, values, knowledge and understanding students gain now, will have a direct impact on the grades they will achieve in Year 11. Similarly, there is no limit to progress and success; there is no ceiling or end point that students reach in Year 11 and can then go no further. For instance, having mastered the GCSE mathematics curriculum, our most able mathematicians are now working on AS Maths, studying concepts and principles from the first year of the A Level course.

It is also really important that students understand that hard work and excellence do not come out of a tap that can be turned on and off when you feel like it. Hard work and excellence are both habits and routines that students learn and develop as they move through school. Students who think that they can just "turn it on" when they want to are ill prepared and are rarely able to.

There have been occasions recently when we have been unable to contact parents or carers during the day as phone numbers have changed. Clearly, home circumstances will change from time to time and I would ask that all parents and carers inform Student Services of any amendments to contact or personal details, so that we can update our records accordingly.

We have been sending out Newsflash for exactly a year now and I hope that you have found each edition useful and informative. This is now one of the main ways in which we keep in touch with parents and carers and we would be grateful for any comments or suggestions you may have on how we can improve your weekly news bulletin.

Thank you for reading this edition of Newsflash and, on behalf of the staff, I hope you have a relaxing and enjoyable Easter weekend.

GCSE COUNTDOWN

We hope you have read the detailed information you have received on planning and preparation for your GCSE exams, your "plan for success". QUALIFYING FOR THE YEAR 11 PROM

We hope that all our Year 11 students will qualify for the Prom but, to do so, they must achieve the following criteria:

• Students must achieve 96% attendance over the remainder of Year 11, starting from week beginning Monday 7th March. This means that all students can achieve this criterion, irrespective of what their attendance was prior to 7th March.

- Students must have no more than 5 lates over the same period.
- Students must receive no exclusions or periods in seclusion over the remainder of Year 11.
- Students must achieve more PRIDE points than Behaviour Points over the remainder of Year 11.

Year 11 students will also be able to earn money off their Prom tickets by attending Lesson 6 study sessions after school.

All Year 11 students are aware of these criteria and will be reminded about them over the remaining weeks leading up to and during the exams.

QUALIFYING FOR THE TRIP TO BLACKPOOL

To qualify for the Blackpool trip, students must achieve the following criteria:

• Either a student's overall attendance from the beginning of the academic year, in September, must be above 96%, or a student must have 100% attendance over the period from Monday 7th March to Friday 17th June. This, again, means that all students can achieve this criteria, irresepective of what their attendance was prior to 7th March.





- Students must receive no exclusions or periods in seclusion from Monday 7th March up until the trip in July.
- Students must have no more than 10 Behaviour Points (including for homework not handed in) from Monday 7th March up until the trip in July.

All students are aware of these criteria and monitor their attendance each week. **We hope that all students who wish to go, will qualify for the trip.** Year Managers will be given some discretion on attendance if an absence is absolutely beyond a student's control.
