

#### **BOOK OF THE WEEK**

The book of the week is 'Star by Star' written by Sheena Wilkinson. The following review was written by Olivia Brennan in Year 7.

'15 year old Stella was brought up in Ireland by her suffragette mother. When her mother dies from the flu pandemic sweeping across Europe in November 1918, Stella is sent to live with her estranged aunt who runs a boarding house. This coincides with a time of great change for the country as women are allowed to vote for the first time. Stella is determined to follow in her mother's footsteps to help make history and, whilst her age denies her the right to vote herself, she goes to great lengths to ensure a former suffragette hunger-striker and childhood friend of her mother is able to cast hers.



In Stella, Wilkinson has created a strong memorable character and has successfully managed to capture the awkwardness of being a teenager. She is a hugely relatable protagonist, particularly to a young person, as she is just like any teenager today. I felt great empathy towards her and I loved how she felt so strongly about things and spoke her mind.

All in all, this is an extremely refreshing and worthwhile read from, clearly, a very talented author. It is the first Sheena Wilkinson novel I've read and after reading 'Star by Star' I will be going back for more. I would recommend the book to anybody, mainly girls, whether they're interested in historical fiction or not. Recommended for ages 11+.'

#### PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE SCHOOL DAY

The Academy Governing Body, Senior Leadership Team and staff have been discussing changes to the school day which we would like to implement at the start of the next academic year in September. As part of the consultation process, Mr Wilson has spoken with all year groups during this week's Assembly and each student has been given a letter to take home for their parents/carers. # **RE: CONSULTATION - CHANGES TO OUR SCHOOL DAY TIMINGS**



Each year we review key aspects of our school provision in order to ensure that your child is provided with the opportunities to develop into a healthy young adult with strong character traits so that they have the best chances of academic success.

This year we have undertaken an extended 5 month review of our Curriculum Offer. This school improvement process has taken place against a background of significant national change in education, including a requirement for all schools to provide a broad, balanced and rich curriculum.

To balance these demands it has been necessary for me to assess the current curriculum provided for your child and to plan changes which I believe will provide a future-proofed curriculum. In order to achieve this, I am proposing a change to the timing and structure of our school day as outlined below.

# From September 2019:

An increase in the number of lessons each week for all students. This will provide additional teaching time for key subjects and enhance the opportunities for the study of Life Skills (Personal, Social, Health and Relationships Education, On-line Safety, Careers and Citizenship Education). This means the introduction of six 60 minute lessons each Monday (one or more of these may be taught as double lessons) as opposed to the current five 60 minute lessons. Therefore, each Monday the formal school day will finish at 3.35pm for all students.

• A change to the length of the school day for Year 11 students every Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday so that their formal school day will finish at 3.30pm on these days.

The additional learning time each day for Year 11 is a formalisation of our current "Lesson 6" provision. As it stands, many of our Year 11 students choose to stay back after school each day for additional study. Some students are invited to stay back and they attend Lesson 6 sessions. This means however, that our current "Lesson 6" sessions are not available to all. From September all Year 11 students will have a formal additional lesson every day of the week. Feedback from teachers and many students has been that this additional learning time is vital in ensuring that our Year 11 students are as prepared as possible for their GCSE examinations.

You may be aware that the new GCSE examinations place significantly increased demands on students. With these increased expectations of what students need to learn, remember and understand, high quality learning time is essential for success. My determination is that any Year 11 student who leaves Droylsden Academy will be equipped to compete with the best students in the country for higher education places and in the employment market. I am convinced that an extended school day for Year 11 students will allow our students the best possible chances to achieve this.

To clarify, from September 2019, school will start at the same time as now (students to be in the building by 8.25am) but it will finish an hour later for all students every Monday at 3.35pm. There will be no change to the current school day for Years 7 - 10 each Tuesday to Friday. However, the school day will end at 3.30pm for Year 11, Tuesday to Friday. The timings and lengths of breaks and lunchtimes will remain as they are now.

I believe that the proposed changes, which have been made after full consultation with staff and Governors, will allow us to provide your child with a curriculum structure which is broader, more balanced and richer. It will further support their academic learning needs whilst providing additional opportunities to develop essential life skills.


